
Activity 1

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Report on volunteering at Aarna Foundation

Objective:

Through community service, students gain real-world experience and practice important habits like leadership, problem-solving and time-management. It also gives the students an opportunity to apply their classroom learning to practical scenarios that have real implications.

Summary:

As a part of the BCE extension project, **Shweta Kaluram Mungasehas** interned at Aarna Foundation from 6 September, 2018 to 21 September, 2018 she spend more than 100 hours helping **in education of the poor children.**

Arna Foundation is a registered NGO established in the year 2014. It works towards the social development of orphans, under privileged children and their families. It provides children from low-level income communities with a high-quality education, enabling them to maximize their potential and transform their lives. It also trains women from lower income group in various courses to help them independent and thus empower themselves.

Shewta was a part of the team of Mr Chinu Kwatra, where she was assigned various tasks like teaching in the slums, campaigning for GO Green, during the Ganesha Festival and cleaning up the beach after the festival.

For the task of teaching in the slums, Shweta had to the small makeshift classrooms arranged by the NGO and help the students who had come there with their studies. The age group of the students varied from 5 years to fifteen years. She would teach them to read, write and mathematics. 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Outcome:

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Report on volunteering at Chai Masti Centre, Dignity Foundation

Objective:

Through this experience of **giving a helping hand to the aged**, and giving a helping hand to the welfare of senior citizens help students gain self-esteem and self-confidence as they were able to help and give comfort to the senior citizens of our society. They also gained knowledge and experience after interacting with citizens who have a vast body of knowledge and experience.

Summary:

Dignity Foundation is an NGO whose mission is to create an enlightened society in which senior citizens feel secure, confident and valued, and can live with dignity. They enable senior citizens to lead active lives through easy access to trusted information, opportunities for productive aging and social support services. The Foundation works assiduously to re-instill in the elderly minds the confidence that age and productivity are not mutually exclusive. This is done by utilizing their experience and maturity in activities that serve the needs of the community. They empower senior citizens with basic awareness and gift them with various services already in existence.

One of the goals of the Foundation is to rid the minds of the senior citizens of negative feelings such as aging is synonymous with loneliness, isolation, and decline. Equality, positive thinking, perseverance, self-belief, and simplicity are the pillars on which Dignity Foundation stands. Dignity Foundation has various centers for the senior citizens, and one is the Chai Masti Centre at Chembur. The group would go to the center two to three times a week as allotted at the time given to them, which was generally the evening tea time. They would look forward to this gathering which was held two or three times a week.

The young volunteers would reach on time to serve them tea and snacks. After the chai time, was Masti time, for which the volunteers would plan a fun activity for all the senior citizens present there. It room would reverberate with shouts of cheer and laughter. Some of the seniors would request to play chess, and the volunteers would take turns to play individual games with them. They would ensure that each of the senior citizens would participate in at least one game. This made the most memorable moments



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for both the aged members and the young volunteers.

The students also conducted classes on how to operate smart phones. Most of the senior had or could afford it, but did not know how to use it. The students patiently taught them each step until each one of the senior were able to use it to their requirement. This made the senior citizens feel that they too can be a part of the technological world which hitherto they had been banished from. It gave a great boost to their confidence.

This time spent with the senior citizens was an emotional education that no book or theory could have given the young students. Chatting and interacting with the senior members also helped the students gain immense practical knowledge that they otherwise would never have known.





So to calm things down, we were well guided by our supervisors who made sure they included every little detail. So just following their instructions and communicating with my friends was enough to get me through the 30 hours of work.

Chapter 2: Description

Day 1 and Day 7: Medical Camp

Date: 8th and 23rd September, 2018

Time: 9 am - 1 pm

Location: Bharat Nagar, Kurla West.

All our members reached the location at 8:45 am. We were briefed by Mr Babu More who was the NGO supervisor. We were separated into different groups - Helping at the Eye check up, Registration of patients and carrying out medicine boxes. As it was our first day, we were afraid of making mistakes but the NGO members made us feel comfortable and helped us whenever we faced difficulties. Inspite of some of us not understanding Marathi, we were helped by our friends. Working together instilled a sense of team spirit and made us aware of the hardships people face everyday.

Day 2 and Day 6: Medical Camp

Date: 9th and 22nd September, 2018

Time: 3 pm - 6 pm and 11 pm - 3 pm

Location - Khar West

This camp was also similar to the one in Kurla, but this was on a bigger scale. The tasks assigned to us also included helping out senior citizens, providing the patients standing in line with water, guiding them to the doctors and make them feel comfortable by spreading awareness. It was afternoon, so it was hot outside and keeping the patients hydrated was an important task. The time was limited so we had to make sure all the tasks like carrying boxes of medicine and eyedrops was done swiftly and efficiently. Members took social media as an effective tool, to spread the awareness about the health checkup camps through various social connecting apps such as Facebook.



All the days that we went to Clean Beaches through Image Foundation were the days after Ganpati Visarjan. So the beach needed some extensive cleaning. When we arrived at the beach, instead if being in awe of it's beautiful we were disgusted by the foul smell and the garbages.

We were quickly briefed by Mr.Siddhesh Nikam and were eager to see the beaches in pristine condition, the way they are supposed to be. We were provided with gloves, masks, rag picking sticks and Garbage bags. We worked in pairs where one would hold the Garbage bags and the other would collect the Garbage. Roles were switched from time to time. We also encountered a man who was pissing on the rocks and asked me to stop and made him aware of what actions like these have a effect on our environment. We also talked to 2 Koli Fishermen who made us aware of the fact that many fish would turn up dead on the shore and the number of fish they caught had drastically decreased. Many a times garbage would get stuck inside the fishing nets rendering them useless. All these problems made us realize the depth of it. Even after cleaning for more than 3 hours on each day, we realized the amount of work that is still left and in spite of doing a good job we weren't fully satisfied as we wanted to see a perfect clean beach.

Chapter 3: Analysis

Arriving at Dadar Chowpatty, I was unpleasantly surprised. The amount of trash observed while I was walking towards our designated spot for the clean-up was simply too astonishing. Previous beach clean-ups I had participated in did not involve that much trash. Work was split and I was with the group clearing the Garbage. Due to waves swirling the trash around the roots at high tide, trash like ropes, plastic bags, plastic strings etc. are being entangled horribly at the shore, making trash was very hard to remove. Much patience was needed, as the removal of the entangled trash was a delicate process to minimize damage to the wildlife. With a huge amount of trash, the clean-up ended with a happy feeling that I had a part in making the world a better place and further reinforce the notion to never litter.

Jay Foundation is an initiative of Jay Shrirangpure to clean up the beaches of Mumbai. As a young professional, Jay always wanted to give back to society, but had no idea on how to go about it. The plan to clean up beaches struch him, when he took his young children to play on Dadar Chowpatty beach. The beach was so filthy and dirty that it filled him with shock and disgust. But instead of turning away, he made it his mission. At the beginning, he would alone, go during his free time and start cleaning up the beach. Soon he found friends, with the same mission and the numbers kept growing. He then started an NGO to expand this mission.

Vinayak and his team would go on Sundays and other public holidays to work with the Foundation to clean up the beach. Together they collected over 1000 tons of plastic waste and other debris from the beach. The activity also taught them many lessons. They started segregating waste at home level and began persuading the people in their neighborhood to do so. They also realized how humans with their careless attitudes have caused the extinction of many marine animals.

The sight of our beach, the day after the immersion of Lord Ganesha, is a sight to sore eyes. Parts of the idol are littered at the full length of the beach. I would also like to thank the authorities of the institution, Mr. Chainani for allowing us to work for 30 hours in the elders' home. Finally, I would like to thank my teammates without whose support this activity would not have been possible.



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INTRODUCTION

An old age home is a place for the elderly, who have been abandoned by their children. Although the necessary amenities are provided for, the love and care of their loved ones is sadly missing.

The concept of an old age home is new in India. It is the departure from the system of joint families and the introduction of nuclear families that has brought this unhappy situation in our society and old age homes have had to come up to cater to the needs of the elderly.

Most of the Indian families take good care of their elders but unfortunately there are people who treat their parents as liabilities and hence make them feel neglected.

Hundreds of organizations are working to make life easy for destitute parents by developing old age homes in India.

There are rare cases when parents themselves prefer the privacy of an old age home but in the majority of these cases, it is the cold attitude of children that forces parents to move in these homes.

Some of these homes are not properly maintained mainly due to lack of funds for its regular upkeep. Therefore, senior citizens are forced to live in unhygienic conditions which is detrimental to their health. Since all these senior citizens are staying away from their families, they often suffer from severe depression and feel lonely. Thus, the authorities of the organization try their best to offer several entertainment programs like organizing a play or a picnic for them in order to help them come out of their personal problems and loneliness. Also, certain hours are allotted to their family members for visiting old age home to keep them in touch with those citizens.



BACKGROUND AND MOTIVATION

When we visited the NGO on the 1st of September 2018, we found living conditions to be deplorable. The NGO hadn't been receiving funds for its regular maintenance and upkeep.

When we happened to glance inside one of the room, we found it in state of disrepair. The walls hadn't been cleaned and passageways were dusty. The senior citizen in the room, seemed to be happy and listening to music on portable radio. At the same time, another senior citizen appeared to serious and disturbed. This is when we saw the two contrasting emotions for the same situation.

This inspired us to try and make difference in the lives of these people in whatever way we could. We therefore decided to make living condition of NGO better for the inmates of this old age home as it would influence their physical and mental health in positive way. All members of our team came to consensus and we then decided to help them with the preparation of ganesh chaturthi as well.

METHODOLOGY

Our group was formed since all of us preferred thane as a ideal location Therefore, we began our search for the NGO in Thane and areas around thane like mulund and nahur Therefore, when we chanced upon H.K.Chainani Old Age Home in Mulund(E), we decided to work there as it suited our timing. The issues relation to these homes are also on rise every day. Therefore, we decided to work for this NGO.

Our task was assigned to us for a period of 30 hours spread over 15 days.

SCHEDULE

From1st September 2018 to 5th September 2018:

We cleaned the dining hall, rooms and passageways of groundfloor.

From 6th September 2018 to 10th September 2018:

We cleaned the passageways and walls of first floor and helped in Ganesh Chaturthi preparations.

From 11th September 2018 to 15th September 2018:

We helped in Ganesh Chaturthi preparations.

MANAGEMENT

Our schedule comprised 2 hours every day from 1st September 2018 to 15th September 2018. We would leave college at 2:45 pm every day and work from 4 pm to 6 pm. We carried hand sanitizers and masks to complete our tasks.

For the first 5 days, we cleaned the dining hall, the ground floor passageways and the office. Our team, in spite of hectic schedules owing to assignments and submissions, managed to take out 2 hours every day for this activity.

During the course of the next 5 days, we cleaned the passageways of the first floor and during the last 5 days, we cleaned the second floor and helped in Ganesh Chaturthi preparations.

Our team bonded well during these tasks and it helped us know more about each other. Even though we had misunderstandings and hiccups, we put our differences aside and worked as a team.



EXPERIENCE

During our activity, we learnt many life lessons. When we first visited the NGO, we found it to be unhygienic. We felt sorry for the senior citizens living there. Since most of us were going to an NGO for the first time, the owner, Mr Chainani was kind to explain the tasks which we would be assigned during the course of 30 hours.

During the first 5 days, we cleaned the dining hall and passageways. The dining hall wasn't in a good state and after cleaning it, we felt a sense of satisfaction and realized that the old age home wasn't being properly maintained.

During the next 5 days, we cleaned the passageways and rooms of the first floor. The rooms were in a state of disrepair and the walls needed cleaning as there were leakages in some rooms and the walls had become damp with moisture.



Justice H K Chainani Elder Home is located at Navghar Road, Opposite Shahani Colony, Mulund East, Mumbai – 400081.

The vision and focus is to provide customized solutions with quality and cost effective care. A strong customer focus approach and constant quest for top class quality and services have enabled the organization to attain and sustain leadership position. This organization was established in the year 1968. The authority works sincerely by taking lot of efforts to give the best service possible.

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STATISTICS

According to a report, India has around 728 old age homes. Out of these, 325 homes are free of cost, 95 homes are on pay and stay basis and 116 homes have both free and pay and stay facilities and 11 homes have no information. A total of 278 old age homes are available for the sick and 101 homes are exclusively for women. Kerala has 124 old age homes which is the maximum in India.

The old age home houses 50 senior citizens, 28 men and 22 women. It has 2 floors and a terrace and consists of about 26 rooms. It also houses a dining hall and a puja room. About 2 to 3 senior citizens share a room, some prefer to live individually. All of the senior citizens gather in the dining hall for breakfast, lunch and dinner.

Lunch and dinner are prepared by 5 staff members of the institution. This organization is run by Mr. Chainani and his 2 daughters.




AUTHORITY OF HK CHAINANI OLD AGE HOME

During tough times, we stuck together and never gave up. While trying to change our NGO, we realized that working together as a team brought us out of the situation in the best way possible.


Overall, this was an experience of a lifetime and has instilled in me a sense of compassion.


